Project Review (approx. 150 words)

I like experimenting with materials and learning new skills to weave into my work. I have a strong interest in textiles and JFFA allows me to explore these avenues and to learn more.

My work lies in between jewellery and fashion/textiles through JFFA I have created these 3D outcomes. Before foundation, I would make samples and sometimes struggle with how to put them on the body. I did Textiles before this foundation, so I have learnt many new jewellery skills such as soldering which allowed me to make more delicate pieces; Learning spot-welding has allowed me to create larger-scale metalwork. Jewellery is always personal, which is similar to the way I work. My own identity influences my work and is a great inspiration to me; I will use textiles primarily in my outcome, but I will also experiment with other things such as metalwork.

Project Concept & Description (approx. 250 words)

I aim to create a wearable piece that conveys this journey of migrating to a new place, the experience of living a new country but also show the challenges; many Caribbean people felt otherness and ostracisation once they had arrived in Britain. I will explore the idea of bringing elements of the home that is left to a new country to then create a new home.

I will work in textiles as I feel they will mimic the interiors of a home well. I want to experiment with more sculptural work on the body and to experiment with form. I feel that I could link this to these immigrants being dehumanised by creating these pieces that distort the human body to show this otherness. This is where Afrofuturism comes in as I want to look at space and this interest that people have with eloping to space to escape our current world.

I want to explore the idea of bringing elements of the home that is left behind to a new country to then create a new home, living rooms are the centrepiece of many homes and many Caribbeans used them to express their West Indian heritage through decor that was common amongst their community.

I will also like to play around with the scale of my work to convey my concept. Maybe creating something smaller to represent how marginalised immigrants can feel or creating something larger and more grotesque to show how others viewed immigrants coming to their country.
